FLETCHER GROUP TO DRIVE ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT WHILE PROMOTING LONG-TERM RECOVERY

LONDON, KY (December 3, 2025) – The Fletcher Group, a 501c3 not-for-profit headquartered in London, Kentucky, has been awarded \$9.2 million to lead Kentucky's role in a new *Connect Appalachia* project that will strengthen recovery ecosystems, address critical workforce shortages, and expand economic opportunity across the region.

"Efforts to address substance use disorder and improve economic opportunity are too often siloed, discouraging the exchange and adoption of effective practices," said Fletcher Group Founder and Chief Medical Officer Dr. Ernie Fletcher. "The Connect Appalachia project will bring together experienced organizations in the six-state service area to provide employers with a high-quality workforce while helping individuals maintain recovery and obtain employment. The Fletcher Group is proud to partner with these organizations to strengthen recovery pathways and expand economic opportunity so that more people can return to work, support their families, and contribute to a brighter future."

As the primary recipient of the grant issued by the Appalachian Regional Initiative for Stronger Economies and funded by the the Appalachian Regional Commission, the Fletcher Group will work hand-in-hand with seven well-known recovery allies: East Tennessee State University, the First Tennessee Development District, Highland Rivers Behavioral Health, Jobs and Hope West Virginia, the Kentucky Chamber Foundation, the New River/Mount Rogers Workforce Development Board, the Center for Regional Economic Competitiveness, the Upper Cumberland Development District, and the Wilkes Recovery Revolution.

Using a Recovery-Ready Workplaces training and education model created during a previous ARISE planning project, the region-wide initiative will serve the economic interests of over 2,500 businesses in 252 communities. The goal is to provide job-readiness training, recovery-friendly workplace training, and job-placement resources to 1,500 people recovering from substance use disorder living in Georgia, Kentucky, North Carolina, Tennessee, Virginia, and West Virginia.

Combined with a laser-like focus on what works best in the real world of SUD recovery, the Fletcher Group's growing nationwide impact (over 5,000 clients, nearly 4,000 training participants, and more than 13,000 technical assistance encounters) has enabled the company to serve as a field catalyst, leading the way to an exciting new era in addiction recovery. The Appalachian Regional Initiative for Stronger Economies is a multi-state initiative launched and funded by the Appalachian Regional Commission to drive regional economic transformation through large-scale, collaborative projects across multiple states. Since January of 2023, \$188.6 million has been invested in 69 projects impacting all 13 Appalachian states. Those investments are projected to create or retain over 22,300 jobs, leverage more than \$274.6 million in additional private investment into Appalachia's economy, and prepare nearly 16,000 workers and students for opportunities in broadband development, workforce education, and manufacturing.
